I Want to be a Worker For Jesus

Intro:

- 1. Lesson summarized: How are we going to spend our time upon the earth?
- 2. Earthly life is structured so that irreversibly consumes time.
- 3. Our days are numbered, our time limited. We must avoid that which is a wasteful, unwise, or unproductive use of time. "The night is coming when no one can work" (Jn 9:4); "See then that you walk circumspectly, not as fools but as wise, redeeming the time, because they days are evil" (Eph 5:15-16).

1. The Basic Concept of Work

- A. The energy and effort (physical or mental) needed to accomplish a specific task.
- B. Most all worthwhile goals in life require work:
 - 1. Establishing and maintaining a family and home.
 - 2. Providing the material necessities of life.
 - 3. Spiritual growth and development.
 - 4. Preserving and promoting the kingdom of Christ.
- C. Our attitude toward the work that this life requires will determine to a large degree our personal happiness and eternal destiny.

2. Foundation Principles of Work

- A. Man created for industrious activity Gn 1:28; 2:15.
- B. Half-hearted, shoddy efforts are unacceptable Ecc 9:10; Col 3:23. This is an important key to fulfillment and satisfaction.

- C. All labor of which God approves is valuable Eph 6:5-8.
- D. Lawful labor is the key to God's approval Col 3:17.
- E. Of top priority is laboring for eternal life Jn 6:27.

Discussion

- 2. How can our work ethic reflect badly upon Christ?
- 3. How can Jesus say, "Do not labor for the food which perishes ..." and Paul say, "If anyone will not work, neither shall he eat" (Jn 6:27; II Th 3:10)? Are they contradictory?

3. Balancing Work and Materialism

- A. {See chart}
- B. Proper view of material goods:
 - 1. Material things are not permanent Mt 6:19-21.
 - 2. Non-transferrable to spiritual world 1 Tim 6:7; Ecc 5:15.
 - 3. Complicate life; bring anxiety and trouble Ecc 5:12.
 - 4. Cannot serve God and mammon (Aramaic A term for material riches that implies trust in them.) Mt 6:24.
- C. We can become so consumed with the daily chore of supplying our daily and future needs that we forget to look past them to the ultimate goal spiritual service.

4. Work in the Kingdom

A. If great effort is required to bring the physical world into submission, is surprising that it also takes a great amount of work to bring souls into submission to Christ?

- 1. Some have an "I can't" attitude that gives up before trying.
- 2. Others have adopted the spirit of the age: "It's not my problem."
- 3. Jesus acknowledged the work to be done but lamented "the laborers are few" (Mt 9:37-38).

 - 2. Titus should be a ______ of good works (2:7).
 - 3. The brethren in Crete should be:
 - a. _____ for good works (2:14).
 - b. for every good work (3:1).
 - c. Careful to ______ good works (3:8, 14).
- C. Areas where work is needed:
 - 1. Teaching:
 - a. Of young wives/mothers Tit 2:3-5.
 - b. Of the congregation 1 Tim 4:6, 11, 16; 2 Tim 4:1-2.
 - c. Of other teachers 2 Tim 2:2.
 - 2. Encouragement: Gal 6:1-5 Rather than consume each other (Gal 5:15), the Galatians needed to help brethren who had been overcome by the world.
 - 3. Evangelism: There are lost people whose best hope to learn the truth is **YOU!**
