
When God's Word Doesn't Seem to Make Sense The Enigma of Punishment

1. Discipline: Outgrowth of Love - Heb 12:5-7

A. **God:** Chastening – *paideia* – The unpleasant aspect of training child. Love Rebuke – *elencho* – A deserved correction, conviction of wrong. Scourging – from *mastix* – a scourge, whip.

B. **World:** This is abuse, brutality, violence, violation of rights, inhumane, etc. It is outlawed in many European countries and will be here. Already chilling effect.



C. The world's wisdom: "You can't teach a child not to hit by hitting!"

Answer: No, you teach a child to respect, obey parental authority which says, "Do not hit!" Create climate of respect. At certain ages, this is the best way to convey the message.

2. "If You Are Without Chastening ..." - Heb 12:8

- A. Why are so many children "without chastening"?
 - 1. Parents tired Either lazy or overworked; two working parents with no energy. Overcompensation for being gone too much.
 - 2. No courage Confrontation too unpleasant; don't want Johnny to cry, hate me. Call bluff: One parent let child bang head on floor in tantrum. Didn't last long.
 - 3. Parents' past failures "After all, *I* did such and such ... and I turned out OK." Parents' mistakes don't rob of moral authority but substantiate it.
- B. What does it produce? Smart-aleck kids with no respect for others or their property, chaos and bedlam (sometimes in *worship*), tantrums, demanding little dictators who run their households, weak parents who cannot muster control. **It produces REAL child abuse.** It produces in the end, *social turmoil and anarchy*. And it brings God's wrath 1 Sam 2:22-25, 29-30, 3:13.
- C. Effective chastening Heb 12:11.
 - 1. Momentarily grievous. *It must be unpleasant to deter.* Spanking gives way to other forms of discipline, but is must always have punitive value. We must be careful, however, not to go too far and provoke to wrath Eph 6:4.

- 2. Afterward yields peaceable fruit of righteousness. Punishment is a training mechanism. It is not a way for parents to blow off steam or domineer their children but show them the benefits of respecting authority and living right.
- 3. There must be *balance*: love, affection, encouragement, time, praise along with limits, correction, punishment, accountability, restitution, etc.

3. The Good News: Parents Don't Have to Be Perfect - Heb 12:9-10

- A. The proverbs are truisms, maxims the speak of the way things generally go. Pr 23:13-14; 22:6, 15.
- B. However, there is a window of opportunity which may be missed Pr 19:18. It is *younger* than inexperienced parents think. Children want and need limits, even though they resist and challenge those limits. Wise parents will not give in.
- C. Having done all, *there are no guarantees!* Even God's discipline did not ensure faithfulness on the part of Israel.

Conclusion: This is a battle parents MUST win! You have to be tougher than your child. He/she needs strength, not a wimpy buddy. We need to earn their trust, just as we must learn to trust and obey God (am lesson).
