## A More Excellent Way

## 1. Three Threads of Concern for Others

- A. 1 Cor 8:1, 11-13 Arrogance caused knowledgeable brethren to "offend" weak.
  - 1. Callousness caused weak brother to "perish" though Christ died to save him.
  - 2. Such amounted to sin against Christ, Himself (v 12).
  - 3. Concern for brother's spiritual welfare caused Paul to forego liberties, rights.
- B. 1 Cor 9:19-22 Paul servant to all "that I might win the more."
  - 1. This meant conforming to customs, scruples to establish common ground.
  - 2. Paul strove to be "all things to all men" (9:22). This is not hypocrisy or deceit but appreciating, respecting others in spite of differences.
  - 3. Paul's goal: "that I might by all means save some."
- C. 1 Cor 10:23-24, 31-33 Selflessness must prevail.
  - 1. Acting merely upon basis of what is "lawful" is insufficient. Must also consider what is helpful, edifying.
  - 2. We are to seek "the others' well-being" (10:24).
  - 3. Doing all to the glory of God involves giving no offense to any (10:32).

## 2. The Consummate Description of Love - 1 Cor 13:1-7

- A. 13:1-3 Principle: Love is essential in all service offered to the Lord; otherwise, the server becomes of no consequence (though his actions might still benefit others Ph 1:15-18).
- B. 13:4-7 Consider love's qualities in relation to what was happening in Corinth:
  - 1. Factionalism Name-dropping, partyism is self-glorifying. But true love "does not seek its own" (13:5); "does not parade itself, is not puffed up" (13:4).
  - 2. Incest, idolatrous harlotry "Love does not rejoice in iniquity, but rejoices in the truth" (13:6).

- 3. Lawsuits "Love suffers long" (13:4); "thinks no evil" (an account or ledger of wrongs suffered leading to resentment or bitterness 13:5).
- 4. The envious, less-gifted members "Love does not envy" (13:4).
- 5. Divorce/meats/covering/corruption of Lord's supper All contain elements of rude, self-seeking, unkind and arrogant behavior, things foreign to love.
- C. In 1 Cor 13 Paul is summarizing the solution for all the problems among the brethren in Corinth (or Belview, or Hueytown, or ...).
  - 1. The secret of true spirituality was not raw knowledge for they had that.
  - 2. The secret is not the fullness, variety of spiritual gifts they had those, too.
  - 3. The "secret" of true spirituality and the overall health of the body is for each member *first* to love God (8:3) and *then* to love those who are God's.

## 3. Application

- A. Were the Corinthians so different from us?
  - 1. How many church splits could have been avoided by practicing this passage?
  - 2. How many arguments have been blamed on "personality problems"?
  - 3. How much energy has been (and is) wasted by squabbling at the expense of the lost?
- B. When we talk about "restoring New Testament Christianity" we usually mean church organization and work. But have we missed something of vital importance? What about New Testament *attitudes?*
- C. 1 Cor 13 is not difficult to *understand*, but it is a challenge to *practice*.
